Conexión Comunitaria & FBLA

As the Colorado FBLA District One State Officer this past year, I have taken advantage of numerous opportunities. One of our state officer initiatives this year was for all officers to complete the four levels of the Business Achievement Awards (BAAs), including the final capstone. At first, I was hesitant to begin. Uncertainty overshadowed what direction to take with my capstone or how best to contribute to my community. However, it became clear that the BAA capstone aimed to spark a passion project in each member, evoking growth in leadership skills and empathy.

An idea for my capstone emerged while working on a simple essay for my Spanish class. Their lack of confidence in the English language often led to missed news and opportunities such as school functions, town celebrations, and local elections. In response, I created a program called Conexión Comunitaria, or Community Connection. Conexión Comunitaria entails monthly in-person meetings and Spanish-language newsletters tailored to Hispanic residents of the Johnstown-Milliken community. Its primary goal is to break linguistic and cultural barriers. Thus far, we've witnessed a gradual yet consistent rise in meeting attendance along with unanimous positive feedback on content and enjoyment. The success of Conexión Comunitaria underscores the vital role of FBLA and its programs. Through just one of its many initiatives, FBLA promotes significant impact and change. The experiences I have gained as a state officer, through attending conferences, meeting new people, and exploring the business world have profoundly shaped me both as a leader and as an individual. I am thoroughly grateful for the lessons FBLA has imparted over the years and eagerly anticipate further growth and learning opportunities.

We reached twenty-two 6th, 7th, and 8th-grade students and created lessons to simulate an experience similar to that of a Middle School FBLA Chapter. Lessons included practice competitions covering skills such as Marketing, Entrepreneurship, and Competitive success.

This first attempt to grab students' attention and promote awareness for the American Enterprise System and FBLA was a huge success as all the 8th graders who graduated from YBLs joined our FBLA Chapter this year and even took first at the District Leadership Conference in their respective events.

Cash Crash Course:

On a personal level, it was gratifying to see the immense success of Young Business Leaders at Campus Middle School; I felt we could take this one step further and expand into a new audience. This year, we looked to provide opportunities for elementary schools, serving two purposes: Allowing other Cherry Creek FBLA members to share their love of business with these younger kids while also creating opportunities for the elementary school students to see finance and business in a fun way and foster a passion for financial education.

We successfully reached three different elementary schools, with around 18 different classrooms in total, meaning we were able to impact over 400 students, ensuring that not only students but other teachers and schools see the benefits that FBLA brings to its community. In the upcoming years, we hope to utilize the

lessons specifically developed for each grade level and expand into other elementary schools outside of our school district. I hope to one day see these young students as members of Young Business Leaders, and ultimately as members of an FBLA chapter.

State Office Candidate:

Colorado FBLA, as a State Officer and prospective National Officer, I plan to continue what I have started, advocating and growing FBLA as an organization and spreading awareness of the positive impact we bring to our communities through our continued endeavors. 
The Financial Literacy Deficit


Shriya Ginjupalli Grandview High School
