#### **Trunk or Treat!**





## Chapter Challenges & Peak Awards

A good way to increase your chapter's recognition is by participating in national Chapter Challenges as well as Colorado's Peak Awards. Both of these activities can be found in Colorado FBLA's Livebinder under the Program's Awards/Recognitions tab. There are three chapter challenges throughout the year: Super Sweeps, Non-Stop November, and Action Awareness. Each challenge spans multiple months and is submitted through the national website once an adviser sets up a chapter login. On the other hand, Peak is a year-long process due in March. In my chapter, my main job as an executive officer is to delegate and submit these different awards. If your chapter is interested in participating in these challenges going forward, here is a list of tips I've learned throughout the year:

Understand the Awards! If you do not know what chapter challenges are due in which months or how to submit activities, make a list. Chapter Challenges require a login which needs to be set up by your adviser; the format is very similar to a BAA where certain activities are required but there are a certain number of others that you chose. With Peak, you can select any number of activities for certain point values. There are five peak awards, Peak 1 only requires 120 points whereas Peak 5 requires 300+ points. Peak utilizes a spreadsheet to log points collected as well as a slideshow to log documentation (because of this I recommend requiring Peak documentation in the form of image files).

- Super Sweeps: August Late October
- Non-Stop November: November Mid December
- Action Awareness: January Early March
- Peak: Due Early March

Plan Ahead! At the beginning of the year/each semester, plan your chapter activities out based on Peak activities. It's a great way to discover ways for your chapter to become more involved with the state and with your members.

Delegate! I cannot stress this enough. Peak and Chapter Challenges are made for an entire chapter to complete so do not place all the work on yourself or an adviser. Create an ongoing document with activities assigned to other chapter officers/committee members who can collect the required documentation.

Set Deadlines! I personally have been delegating documentation to officers due on a monthly basis. It is easier to keep track of and also help set goals for your chapter to complete in specific months. Because Peak is a year-long award, it can be easy to procrastinate and get behind on documentation; hold yourself and your officers accountable. Doing Peak in a few nights is a huge undertaking, save yourself the last minute effort and do it throughout the year instead. With these tips, I hope to encourage more chapters across the state to participate in both of these awards. They are a great way to further local involvement in the program of work and statewide activities, increase membership, and boost morale.





#### 'Time' Kid of the Year: Gitanjali Rao

On January 4, 2021 Colorado FBLA got to start off the new year in such a humbling and inspirational way! Staff from the FBLA-PBL National Center and from Colorado FBLA received the opportunity to virtually interview 'Time' Kid of the Year, Gitanjali Rao. State adviser, Jen Girvin, and Vice President of Education, Kylie Purkeypile, represented and spoke on behalf of Colorado FBLA when interviewing Gitanjali.

Gitanjali discussed her point of view on FBLA; such as why she joined, what it has done for her, and how the skills and information she has learned has been applicable to her successes.

Gitanjali Rao is a 15 year old scientist and inventor from Colorado. She was awarded the title "Time's first ever Kid of the Year". This is an incredible honor on her behalf! She was awarded this honor through her astonishing work. Gitanjali has done many things at such a young age; for example, she invented a device called "Tethys" that uses carbon nanotubes which react with lead and allow for her device to determine if drinking water is contaminated with lead or not. She has also focused on tackling issues dealing with cyberbullying and opioid addiction.

Aside from being a public figure, young scientist, and inventor, Gitanjali is also an active member of Colorado FBLA. Gitanjali talked about how FBLA has made an impact on herself and her successes at such a young age. Before she decided to join FBLA, she neglected anything related to business. Later on she realized how much the skills and information within FBLA applied to her inventions and scientific thinking. Some applicable functions she has learned and use include management, product design, public speaking, and production. She also gained valuable knowledge regarding advocating for issues in today's society and being a young student leader. FBLA opened doors for Gitanjali that allowed her to understand the important role business plays in her work. FBLA has also allowed her to add a business aspect to her innovative processes.

Gitanjali emphasized innovation greatly throughout the interview. Her goals target teaching young students like herself the process of innovation, and how you can turn an idea into a realty. Since being honored as 'Time" Kid of the Year, Gitanjali has been asked to speak to students all over the world. So far she has visited countries including Kenya, Nepal, Afghanistan, and more.

Gitanjali Rao's brilliant mind will make a large impact on our world. It will be exciting to see where Gitanjali goes from here as she continues to encourage students to innovate and bring ideas to life!


