- Allowing users to leave reviews or ratings
- Sorting businesses by reviews or ratings
- Saving or bookmarking favorite businesses
- Include a way to display special deals or coupons

Data Analysis

In 2028, the Olympic Games will return to the United States for the first time since the 2004 Winter Olympic Games in Salt Lake City. SportsFanatics, a fictitious sports consulting agency based in San Antonio, is developing recommendations to plan the 2028 Olympic Games in Los Angeles, California, specifically to support athletes, the city, and the National Olympic Committees (the countries sending athletes). Using the provided data and your own research, identify trends and make recommendations based on the data and external factors. Public domain data accessed by Kaggle, an online data repository:

- Athlete Events Dataset contains information on each athlete between 1896 and 2016. Note
 that event offerings have changed over time. Also note that until 1992, the Summer and Winter
 Olympic Games were held in the same year. Height data is provided in centimeters and weight
 data is provided in kilograms.
- <u>NOC Regions</u> Dataset includes supporting information defining the National Olympic Committee country sponsoring the athlete.

She seeks guidance on budgeting, managing student loans, balancing retirement and investment priorities, and determining whether additional insurance or financial planning support is right for her.

Financial Statement Analysis

- What changed? Highlight key differences between this year's financial statements and prior periods: revenues, costs, margins, assets, liabilities, etc.
- What does it mean? Analyze what those changes reveal about Chipotle's current financial health (profitability, liquidity, efficiency, and solvency). Use ratios, trends, and relevant benchmarks.
- What's next? Recommend 2–3 strategic business decisions backed by your analysis. These could focus on:
 - o Growth opportunities (e.g., new markets, menu expansion)
 - Cost controls or efficiency improvements
 - Financial Risk Management

Introduction to Programming

Build a Virtual Pet

Use your programming skills to create a digital pet that users can name, feed, and care for over time. Your pet should respond to how well it is treated, showing emotions, changing appearance or behavior, and developing based on the user's actions.

To expand your program, include a "cost of care" system to teach users about the financial responsibility of pet ownership. Track things like:

- Food and supply costs
- Vet visits or health care
- Toy or activity purchases
- Budget limits or in-game currency

Your program should include:

- Customization (user names the pet, chooses type, etc.)
- Pet care features (feed, play, rest, clean, health check)
- Reactions based on care level (happy, sick, sad, energetic)
- A running total of care-related expenses
- Optional: savings goals or earning systems (e.g., chores or tasks to earn pet care funds)

Encourage creativity in how the pet grows or changes over time: Could it evolve, learn tricks, or earn badges? Use any programming language or environment that demonstrates your understanding of basic logic, variables, conditionals, and functions.

School Lost-and-Found Website

- A searchable listing of all found items
- A claim/inquiry form for students to request information about or claim a listed item
- A basic backend system or admin view to review, approve, or manage item postings

Focus on clean design, functionality, and user experience. You must code the website from scratch using code of your choice. Use of databases or other backend tools is encouraged to enhance functionality.

Design an educational website for an online learning hub—created by students, for students—to make learning more engaging, collaborative, and accessible.
